#### CAMP AGAWAM RECEIVES ACCREDITATION

Once again everyone in the Agawam Family can be proud that Camp has been re-accredited by the *American Camping Association*. The accreditation process requires that trained visitors come to Agawam once every three years to make sure we continue to be in compliance with close to 300 standards! The

standards deal with areas such as Site, Food, Transportation, Operations Management, Human Resources, Health and Safety, Program Design, Aquatics Safety, Ropes Course Safety, Trip Safety. There are 26 "mandatory" standards, which camps must meet in order to remain accredited and in each other section a camp must score above 80% to remain accredited. Below is a sampling of some of the nearly 300 standards that Agawam continues to meet as part of our accreditation program (*from Accreditation Standards for Camp Programs and Services*, 1998, American Camping Association, Martinsville, IN):

- Are all buildings used for sleeping constructed or equipped with smoke detection equipment in working order?
- Are food service staff required to minimize the time that potentially hazardous foods remain in the food temperature danger zone of 40 to 140 degrees Fahrenheit?
- Does the camp have written evidence that behind-the-wheel training and practice for camp drivers has been provided?
- Does the camp have health care policies and procedures that have been reviewed within the last three years by a licensed physician?
- Does the camp have written materials for risk management planning?
- Does the camp provide at least 6 days of pre-camp training for camp program personnel?
- Does the camp have written evidence that the skills of each staff member to teach or assist in specialized program activities are verified and evaluated prior to leading activities?
- To guard each swimming activity, does the camp provide a staff member who has certification as a lifeguard by a nationally-recognized body <u>and</u> written documentation that he or she has demonstrated skill in rescue and emergency procedures specific to the aquatic area guarded?
- Does the camp have written evidence of annual inspection by qualified personnel of challenge/ropes course elements for integrity of all hardware, materials, and equipment?
- Are all campers and staff required to participate in pre-trip orientation that includes at least information on safety regulations and emergency procedures, first aid procedures, health and sanitation practices, environmental protection, rendezvous times and places, and training on how to obtain medical and emergency assistance on the trip?

Agawam has been a part of the American Camping Association's accreditation program since its inception nearly 50 years ago. We believe strongly in the program and its value in ensuring safety and quality in children's camping. Because of this belief, we are proud that not only are we accredited, but we are the camp in Maine with the most number of trained Standards Visitors on staff. Our trained Visitors are: "Chief' Garth Nelson, Barbara Nelson, "Bowman" Scott Malm, "Capt" Diehl Estes, and "Bos'n" Bill Auerswald. "Bowman" Scott Malm also serves on the section standards committee and as an instructor, training new volunteer visitors. Luckily, thanks to the generosity of the Agawam Family, we have a large open space in Lower Mason Hall, directly below the Dining Room. Several staff and volunteers had cleared and cleaned the room and had a blazing fire providing light for the room as campers in their tribal lines entered the room sitting in a circle on the floor. "Chief" Garth Nelson then led the singing of "The Long, Long Trail A-winding" as candle light was passed from "Chief" to each of the tribes. The ceremony continued with the recognition of those who worked for and earned their Woodcrafter Awards, announcement of those selected for the Totem Society, and the final thanks and recognition of our 15 year old campers. After Taps was sung and "Chief" said his season ending line, "Goodnight boys, see you next year!", the candles were blown out and final goodbyes were said – everyone dry and safe from the lightning storm now passed. It was a memorable evening, although our 15 year old graduates were disappointed. But hopefully, the fact that they were the class which finished their camper careers in such a different way, would serve to make their memories special. #### AGAWAM COUNCIL BOARD NOTES

#### Annual Meeting Held August 16 and 17, 2003

Board Members, Committee Members, Staff, and friends gathered on the weekend of August 16, 2003 for the 18<sup>th</sup> Annual Meeting of Agawam Council. On Saturday morning the Council Members gathered in Mason Hall to hear from Tom Smith, who presented information on Planned Giving Programs, specifically designed to help the Council focus on the importance of nurturing the Hiawatha Society. This presentation was followed by Committee meetings on Saturday afternoon.

On Sunday everyone gathered in Mason Hall for the Annual Meeting which was called to order by Council President, Pete Caesar. In his report, Pete noted that Camp Agawam is in good shape physically and with a fine management team in place. He encouraged all Council members to visit camp during the season to get a better feel for what is happening at Agawam toady. Next, "Chief" Garth Nelson reported on the camp season. He began with the Main Idea which had 90 campers, many of whom were returning campers. We also were fortunate to have a fine group of alumni volunteers to help out. He pointed out that Agawam continues to build good will in the community through extending the Agawam experience through the Main Idea. The seven-week season was slightly under-enrolled with 119 campers, on a target of 130 campers. Due to hard work in the financial area, and with the support of the Budget committee, Agawam was able to do some belt-tightening, and did not have to draw on reserves for this season. The summer program was strong and included some adjustments in the Ag-Wam format and Specialty class scheduling, a great trip program, and strong inter-camp competition. Awards Night was held inside due to inclement weather. The weather was rocky through much of the summer, although we avoided much of the rain that soaked other areas in New England – gray skies and misty days were frequent visitors this summer. PAPA camp (Portsmouth Academy of Performing Arts) was held for the 14<sup>th</sup> time during our post-season. The new soccer fields continue to be used by Camp Cedar's soccer training clinic for independent schools, the Berwick (ME) Academy Soccer team, and the Raymond Youth Soccer League. We have completed and will soon implement a Forest Management Plan, and work has been completed to control storm water and erosion issues on the South Road (back camp road). Agawam boys and staff participated in a number of local community service projects including: Casco Days, building a prizewinning float, and running in the Road Race, the Audubon Society's Annual Loon Count, the local blood drive and at the Casco Library's book sale. Agawam was also re-accredited by the American Camping Association.

#### PROGRAM COMMITTEE (Steve O'Leary – Chair)

Reported that the program was in good shape. The committee discussed winter programming with a proposed Winter Ski Program which might be held after Christmas. The committee also reviewed the Sunday Vespers and Weekly Awards programs as a part of their on-going evaluation of the Agawam program.

#### PLANT COMMITTEE (Peter Mason – Chair)

The committee took a walk all around camp's property to get a view of all of Agawam's buildings and the full scope of the property we now own. They reviewed the 2003 capital projects completed or under way (refinished Mason Hall floor, Centerfield Rock Septic System, new Trip Room deck, South Road erosion control project, Forbes Field erosion control berm, and the resurfacing of the Basketball and Tennis Courts). They also reviewed projects which still need to be done including repairs to the Agawam Road, the infirmary, Esty House, the office, Arts & Crafts, and the final refurbishment and reframing of the Governor Hall pictures. They reported that the operational maintenance budget is OK for annual work,

but suggested that the Council examine ways to more fully fund capital projects, many of which are beyond the scope of the amounts currently budgeted.

DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE (facilitated by Jim Carroll for Rich Schaberg – Chair)
The committee reported that it was once again pleased to report that they have exceeded their 2003 fundraising goal, with \$142,000 raised on a goal of \$139,000, which included \$24,000 raised at the annual phonathon, and \$36,000 raised at our Golf Marathon for Maine Camperships. The goal of 2004 was set at \$150,000, with \$10,000 to go towards an Alumni Gift/85<sup>th</sup> Reunion project that would benefit the Agawam Campus. They reported that the Courts Campaign and the Governor Hall Campaign have been successfully completed, and that they will continue towards a target of 85 founding members of the Hiawatha Society to be recognized at the 85<sup>th</sup> reunion Council Fire. The Mary William Gregg Endowment for Leadership Enrichment, a fund designed for professional development of Agawam staff

members is moving towards a successful completion of its Phase II goal of moving towards establishing a \$100,000 endowment. The committee continues to seek ways to acknowledge donation of time, experises

and energy, in addition to financial gifts.

The committee reviewed and approved the McDonald Page auditors report for fiscal year 2002. They also reviewed the findings concerning the encroachment issues on the Wabinoden property, as well as issues surrounding the best use of that property. The committee will meet again in November to complete work on the 2004 budget which will be approved by the full board at the February meeting. The committee discussed the 2004 tuition, and set it at \$5500 for a full season and \$3465 for a half season. They also discussed investment of our endowment funds, reviewing current performance and confirming our current investment strategies.

COMMUNICATIONS AND ALUMNI RELATIONS COMMITTEE (Peter Gould – Chair) The committee reviewed a number of issues concentrating on the completion of the Governor Hall Photograph refurbishments, a brief written project on tales from Agawam which will hopefully be published in time for the 85<sup>th</sup> reunion, publicity for the Main Idea and Golf Marathon, the 2004 85<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Reunion Celebration, and the completion of the Crisis Management Plan. Much time was spent on the current design and hoped for improvements to the Camp Agawam website (www.campagawam.org)

EVALUATION AND HUMAN RESOURCES (facilitated by Tony Mason for Peter Esty – Chair) Passed out the Evaluation of the Executive Director of Agawam Council and discussed the nature of evaluation techniques to make sure we capture the essence of what we are trying to evaluate. The committee will continue to evaluate and revise all of our evaluation tools to be sure we are keeping up with peer institutions and not "resting on our laurels" but continually growing and improving.

#### NOMINATING COMMITTEE (John Schmidt – Chair)

Officers for 2003-2004 were approved, new Directors appointed, along with thanks to all departing members and officers. Officers: Bob Demont - President, Frank Anthony – Vice President, Tim Crane – Treasurer, Bob Fryer – Secretary. New Directors: Lang Bell, Andy Cobb, Mark Jones. Retiring Directors: Steve Frank, Peter Mason, Steve O'Leary, Mike Pescatello. The committee also discussed the process for awarding The Sachem Award to recognize outstanding alumni service. The committee also continued its discussion of the make up and size of the Board and Committees, making sure we honor who have committee time, treasure, and talent, as well as including new members who would like to become involved.

## MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT Bob Demont ('74)

Dear Agawam Friends,

"Summer is like childhood. It passes too fast. But if you are lucky, it gives you warm memories from which you take strength in the cold days ahead. Summer is also like childhood, in that you may not think what you are doing matters very much while you are doing it, but later on you realize it mattered far more than you knew."

Edward Hallowell "Childhood Roots of Adult Happiness."

With our first and only child turning thirteen recently, we thought we could use some help in our continuing struggle to stress character for her as she confronts a society that often does not. So we attended Dr. Hallowell's gathering of educators and parents in Portland recently. We got the needed douse to get us through the long Maine winter (ayuh!) until Kayte will likely spend her fourth summer at a sister camp that also stresses character first.

Based upon current research as well as his own experiences as a parent, teacher, and child psychiatrist, Dr. Hallowell identifies five key roots to adult happiness. The first and most important of all these, he concludes, is a child's "connection" in the form of unconditional love from an adult or parent.

My first "connection" with Agawam occurred in 1974 when I was recruited by Dave Mason to be a counselor in the summer after my freshman year in college. This was a late connection perhaps at age nineteen, but that summer Dave and the extended Agawam family stirred something in me that would only fully emerge fifteen years later as a Main Idea volunteer. Since then as a volunteer and Board member, I have come to greatly appreciate how special Agawam is to both its seasonal and Main Idea campers, helping kids to make healthy connections with Agawam staff led by Agawam's Garth Nelson.

Agawam really matters to me, in large part because I have chosen to become involved and stay connected to a healthy environment for kids. I hope others including those who may not have connected with Agawam for many years might consider doing so at this time. On the Maine Turnpike, we welcome people to "Maine, The Way Life Should Be." I encourage alumni, friends and parents of Agawam to join me in playing a role in restoring childhood to "the way it should be." There are many ways to do so including: referring campers and staff, volunteering (Main Idea, phonathons, golf marathons, board/committee service, etc), attending the 85<sup>th</sup> reunion, or visiting camp while in Maine.

If your experience is anything like mine, get involved and you will not only serve our children, but you will also be strengthened yourself, and your family too will be blessed by the experience.
