From beginning to end, Agawam's eighty-fifth summer was special. Kicked off in fine fashion by the largest Main Idea ever, the season hummed along through June, July, and August, culminating in a most pleasant gathering during the 85th Anniversary Reunion Weekend. Ten weeks of activity that positively affected almost 300 children and a like number of adults!

The key ingredients for successful camping at Agawam are always: happy campers; motivated counselors and staff focused on those campers; and cooperation from Mother Nature.

As Sachem of the Agawam Tribes, I am often seen (especially before Council) communing with the gods of the Four Winds to determine the fate of our program! To the extent that I can take credit for it (?!!), this summer weather worked in our favor. Though a little rainier than normal, even most of that came at good times. And, the cool temperatures made for a healthy camp – very active during the day and able to sleep at night!

We are fortunate that so many of our campers grow up to be counselors! The 2004 staff was one of the finest I've seen – ably led by several senior statesman who were well supported by a wonderful group of younger folks eager to learn. The group's strongest common theme was a dedication to the welfare of the children in our care. It was clear to me that our staff's focus last summer was to create the most positive growth and learning experience for our campers. They should all be commended for a fine effort.

And, the boys!! Spread across our age spectrum from 8-15, a total of 140 Agawam campers brought energy, enthusiasm, laughter and fun to the shores of Crescent Lake. The stability of our camper group again showed its value, as 16 fifteen-year-olds led the way, joined by 82 other returning campers and 42 boys new to our camp family. Agawam enjoys an annual camper return rate in the neighborhood of 80%, providing a fine base upon which to preserve our tradition and culture. The annual influx of 35 to 40 new campers keeps us fresh and growing. The leadership of the Upper Campus (14 and 15 yearolds) was exceptional, and it was recognized by an organized "Switch Day" near the end of the season, during which older boys performed the duties of the counselors throughout the day!

Understandably, when speaking of the summer, a focus falls on the seven-week session. But, there is so much more to an Agawam season!

The Main Idea week is near and dear to our hearts each season. In 2004, we welcomed the largest group ever to Camp - 93 campers - with a return rate similar to Camp Agawam, providing consistent and continuing opportunity to these Maine boys. Since its inception, the Main Idea has welcomed campers from nine to thirteen years of age, and made an effort to retain them throughout that span. In recent summers, we have offered special programming for our oldest boys and built a loyalty to Camp in that group. It's exciting to report that, at the 2004 summer meeting of our Board, an expansion of the Main Idea was approved. In 2005, we will be adding about 15 fourteen-year-olds to Main Idea, creating a target population of 105! The more boys we can reach through this program, the better, and plans are afoot to grow Main Idea even more.

For the last 15 summers, after Camp Agawam concludes, we have hosted a performing arts camp from the Portsmouth Academy of Performing Arts in Portsmouth, NH. Last summer, their PAPA Camp flourished, with 95 boys and girls enjoying one of the finest parts of the summer at Agawam.

We continue to reach out to the broader community, as well. Coincident with the PAPA Camp, we provide athletic field space (on the former White/Bailey/Turner Farm) for two weeks of soccer camp for prep school boys' and girls' teams in the Northeast. And finally, getting back to our local children, for three falls now, Agawam has hosted the Raymond Youth Soccer program. We enjoy the echoes of more than 200 children each week for two months after Camp "closes"!

The evolution of our programming has resulted in a significant increase in our outreach to children – all with an emphasis on our core values, maintenance of tradition, and an awareness of our broader community and our place in it.

WATER, WATER EVERYWHERE...

The conclusion of the 2003 season saw the demise of the old water storage tank located behind the wood shop, which had for many years provided water for irrigation throughout the lower part of our campus. This problem provided us with an opportunity to meet one of our long range goals, which was to get water to the new fields at the top of the camp road. The Plant committee worked on several proposals and decided on a multi-year, multi-phased installation of an irrigation system starting with the installation of an appropriately sized pump in year one and ending with irrigation of the upper fields in year five. But thanks to the generosity of three special donors, and the creativity of our budgeting committee, we were able to make great strides in completing well over half of this project in just one year. The end of May saw the installation of a highcapacity pump submerged in Crescent Lake. In the beginning of June, pipe was laid throughout the campus for an in-ground irrigation system providing water for the tennis courts, Forbes Field, the middle

campus, flagpole area, the lawns around Governor Hall and Mason Hall, as well as for the many faucets we have around campus. The system was first tested the day before Main Idea began, and throughout the summer our lawns received all the water they needed between 2 and 5 am. The lawns never looked greener or healthier! This fall will see the system extended towards the upper soccer fields as well. Our thanks go to the three generous donors whose gifts help us make all of this possible: first to the Forbes Family, whose many years at Agawam and devotion to athletics and our campus prompted them to provide leadership for this project; second to Team Prep, our "post-camp" partners, who organize a soccer camp to train high school boys' and girls' soccer teams, who provided additional support; and, finally, thanks to an anonymous donor whose offer of a matching gift enabled us to solicit the gift from Team Prep. Because of the generosity of these friends, Agawam will forever have green and healthy playing fields for all to enjoy.



NEWS OF ALUMNI

BOB CORNELL ('36,'37,'39) – writes to us that he and his wife, Pat, sold their home of 46 years in West Hartford, CT and moved to Duncaster, a retirement community in Bloomfield, CT. They were pleased to have had the chance to visit Agawam and Arcadia (Pat's camp) while staying at the Poland Spring Inn at the end of August.



WILL HUBBARD ('37-'43) – sent us this interesting remembrance from his early days at Camp Agawam: "Everyone should go to summer camp, because it teaches you the things in life that are really important, including how to gain control of a pillow fight and how to make a pie bed. The camping experience includes many important areas of living a full life - learning to swim, how to dive, and believe it or not, housekeeping (you don't want to be kept away from the waterfront for a few days!). Up until 1937, we had been going to Ocean City, MD for our summer vacation, but some of our friends on Woodlawn Avenue in Larchmont, NY told us about Camp Agawam on Crescent Lake, Maine where boys could develop physically, mentally, and spiritually - I think my friends thought that I needed help! The camping experience did not begin in Maine, but at Grand Central Station in New York City, where hundreds of boys and girls boarded trains for the overnight trip to various camps in Maine. Because of the large number of boys and girls on the concourse, finding your camp sign was not an easy task. Excitement was running high, because we had not seen our camp friends for a year. There was much discussion about who would be our counselor, in which cabin we would be living for eight weeks. Just before we boarded our Pullman, our parents wished us well (there were more tears shed among the parents than among the campers, I recall). After about 50 boys and several counselors had settled into our Pullman, we could feel the momentum of the train picking up - we were on the Maine Express, trying to determine who would sleep in the upper berth and who would sleep in the lower. Whoever slept in the lower berth would have control over the inevitable pillow fights that were a part of our "camping experience". There was not air conditioning back in those days, and we knew we were in Maine when the scent of pine permeated our Pullman car. After our 30+ mile trip from Portland to Crescent Lake, we were greeted by the Camp Director, who welcomed us to camp and assigned us to our cabins, after we had eaten breakfast. (It is interesting to note that the Pullman cars were not used after 1941 to take boys to camp; they had been pressed into service to carry our troops). To give you some idea of our daily routine at camp, each day

after breakfast, we were divided into groups to maintain the campus in perfect condition by removing all unwanted debris from the campus. Activity period was supervised by counselors who had expertise in all sports. Only those campers who had passed the swimming test could use a boat or swim in deep water. After swim period, there was a one-hour rest period, which was followed by lunch. Most of the activities in the afternoon were optional, but there was another one-hour rest period, followed by more optional activities and an afternoon swim. In the evenings, campers could spend their time in the library, play table tennis in Governor Hall, or go boating. Some chose to sit on the dock and watch others sail or canoe on the lake. Of course there were trips, some by car, others by canoe. These trips could last as long as one week. Some of the older campers would climb mountains in Maine and in New Hampshire. At the end of the first four weeks parents weekend was an important event, although few, if any, wished to return home after four weeks. In late August, the nights would turn very cool and we would sleep under three blankets. On Sunday nights, Vespers in Governor Hall was a must for all campers to attend. Counselors would talk on important values of life such as honesty, courtesy, sportsmanship, self-reliance and leadership. Music was provided by the Winkler twins, both of whom played the violin, accompanied on the piano by Johnny Phillips. Now we come to the pie beds (sometimes referred to as "short-sheeting"). Unsuspecting campers were introduced to a new way of sleeping. To make a pie bed, you fold the bottom of the top sheet up to the top and then fold it back slightly, which gives the appearance that the bed had not been disturbed since it had been made after breakfast. Most boys went along with the prank, but one boy was so upset that he put his feet through the sheet, ripping it apart! At the end of the eight-week camping season, a banquet was held in the dining room, awards were presented to the campers who had excelled in all sports. There were also awards for leadership, courtesy, and the most improved campers. After the banquet, a candlelight procession would wind from the dining room to the Council Ring where a final solemn ceremony was held before returning home the following day. All of the campers were driven to Portland, where we would say our goodbyes to our counselors and board the Pullman trains to resume our pillow fights. When the train returned to New York City in 1942, our parents surprised us by taking me, along with some friends to see Tommy Dorsey and Frank Sinatra at the Ansley Hotel. We told our parents that we were impressed, but we were more impressed with the "Pullman, Pillow Fights, and Pie Beds!" 

They had a questionnaire at the end of camp every year – favorite trip, favorite counselor, song, activity, etc. It also had the one who is handsomest or smartest and the one who thinks he's the handsomest or smartest camper. I got the last two several times. This is what Agawam was able to do. It taught me a lot.

"One week, Ap delivered to me a basic lesson in sportsmanship which has stayed with me all these years. On returning from a baseball game with neighboring Hawthorne, I explained to Ap that the Hawthorne ump had robbed us of an early-inning home run down the left field foul line. Ap then inquired what had been the final score. When told the score was eight to one in Hawthorne's favor, he pointedly inquired whether the eight Hawthorne runs were also unfairly recorded. I felt positive I flunked sportsmanship that week."

FINANCIAL REPORT

"Bos'n" Bill Auerswald ~ Business Manager Excited to be taking on another new challenge at camp, I began working in May 2004 as Agawam Council's Business Manager and as one of Camp Agawam's Assistant Directors. Agawam Council is a non-profit corporation with assets of nearly \$3,000,000.00, which operates a child care facility in an increasingly complex and regulated environment. As I help to shift some of the burden of day-to-day business operations away from "Chief" Garth Nelson's desk, my role is to protect and preserve our assets and our strong financial position, and to maximize the extent to which we bring those assets to bear on our mission - helping children and young adults to learn and grow in a supportive and safe outdoor setting.

Regarding the stewardship of camp's valuable assets, the Council has long made fiscally prudent decisions that leave us with very low debt levels, well invested and self-sustaining endowments and a history of successful development campaigns to address needs at camp. We are currently engaged in the financial planning necessary to complete maintenance and refurbishment projects to several camp buildings, including Tall Pines, Clausen House, Esty House, the Infirmary, Wood Shop, and the Boathouse. Through careful budgeting we hope to generate the funds needed to complete these projects through several years of camp operations, allowing our development efforts to target support for camperships and the Main Idea, or more major capital projects.

As we try to maximize our ability to use Camp's resources to advance our mission, we will attempt to enroll our summer sessions to a slightly higher level and will increase the number of boys attending Main Idea to approximately 105, for the first time opening our upper campus cabins to Main Idea's oldest boys. By reinvigorating the Agawam Ski and Snowboard Week, so popular in the Agawam Kezar days, and by considering ways in which to use our property for the benefit of school, sports, and youth groups in the beautiful month of September, we may soon see the Agawam experience reach more boys and girls as we better spread the costs of maintaining and improving our property.

Below is an abbreviated balance sheet (reviewed by our independent accountants) that shows our financial position at the close of our 2003 fiscal year. Fiscal 2004 was a strong year that contributed to even greater financial health. Finally, I know that among our Agawam Alumni, there is much wisdom and expertise – I welcome your ideas and suggestions as we continue to make sure we have the financial strength to continue our good work and to further extend both its breadth and depth. CAMP AGAWAM, STINSON LAKE, RUMNEY, NH

Did you know that Camp Agawam was not always in Raymond? It's true! In 1919, when The Governor took to the idea of possibly running a summer camp, he was not sure if it was the right thing for him and his family. Instead of rushing headlong into the camping business, he took a more measured approach and rented land on Stinson Lake in Rumney, NH, a beautiful setting in the foothills of the White Mountains. The Governor decided after three years on this rented property, that camping was for him, and decided to purchase property where Agawam could plant permanent roots and grow. The Stinson Lake property was a possibility, but the steep climb from the waterfront and ballfield back to the living area was considered too much of a chore for the campers and staff alike. Dr. Meylan, a colleague of The Governor at Columbia, and the founder of Camp Arcadia and White Mountain Camp for Boys (now Camp Wohelo), helped the Masons find our current site on Crescent Lake in Raymond, Maine.

On October 14, 2004, Dave and Peg Mason were joined by "Capt" Diehl Estes and "Bowman" Scott Malm for a return trip to the Stinson Lake site to see if we could find the original Camp Agawam. After a stop at the desolate looking, but still operating Stinson Lake Store (with what is fondly known as the country's smallest Post Office inside), they took a trip around the lake until they came upon the only surviving building from Agawam's days in New Hampshire.

The building which had housed The Governor and his family, and which served as the Infirmary for the camp, is still on that hillside overlooking Stinson Lake. The building is now a private home, and Dave left a note for the owner asking if they had any information on the history of the house or the property. From old pictures in the original camp brochures, the group was able to reconstruct the location of the sleeping cabins, tennis courts, dining room/recreation lodge, ballfield and waterfront. All agreed that it was indeed a steep climb up from the waterfront and that our current site in Raymond is a much better location for a summer camp. It was a

beautiful autumn day with blue, sunny skies lighting up the changing leaves. It was easy to see how life on this hillside motivated The Governor and Mother Mason to continue to chase their dream of running a boys' summer camp. If Dave learns anything about the history of the property since Agawam ruled that hillside, we will be sure to share it in a future issue of the Alumni News.

GEORGE GROS MASON January 4, 1916 to September 14, 2004

George Gros Mason, who died peacefully in Berkeley, California, September 14, 2004, after a long illness, was born January 4, 1916 in New York City. The family soon moved to Larchmont, NY where he and his two brothers, Appleton A. Mason, Jr. and David W. Mason attended public schools until George began attending Pawling in upper New York State. He graduated from Amherst College in 1937 and almost immediately began working for W.R. Grace Co.

He was selected to work for Pan American-Grace Airways (Panagra) in 1939 in Sales and Traffic while Panagra opened up the west coast of South America, developing airport meteorological stations and other facilities. He trained with Pan American Airways. It was a colorful period in U.S. aviation. George lived in many South American countries, as well as Panama. He lived for some years in Darien, CT, where he commuted to New York, South America and to IATA (International Air Transportation Association) conferences in Europe. When Braniff bought Panagra on orders from the U.S. Government in 1967, George transferred and worked for Braniff from Tokyo and Honolulu, as Director for the Pacific, until it became the first U.S. airline to go bankrupt in 1981. All in all, he spent 47 years in the international airline business.

Following his retirement, he moved to El Cerrito, CA. He traveled extensively, as long as he was able, and attended as many Agawam reunions as possible, always proud and supportive of the camp which he attended from its founding in 1919 until he went to work for Grace in 1939, first as a camper, then as a counselor, and finally helping to manage the camp after his father, The Governor, died suddenly in 1938. He always followed with great interest every development at the camp and referred to it often.

He leaves behind his wife, Virginia, his son, George G. Mason, Jr. of Houston, TX, his daughter, Wendy A. Mason of Jacksonville, OR, his grandson, Nicholas Adam Mason, who is attending the University of Texas, his brother, David W. Mason of Fryeburg, ME, and a large number of nieces and nephews, all of whom are supportive of Camp Agawam along with a host of alumni and their families.

He always said that the biggest influences in his life, in addition to his parents, were Camp Agawam, Pawling School, and Amherst College. In the words of a college classmate: "George was a natural friend-maker and soon became one of the best-liked members of our class." This comment could be said to fit exactly the pattern of his life wherever he went and whatever he did.

BOARD NOTES

The Board of Directors of the Agawam Council meets each summer at Camp Agawam for its Annual Meeting. This year's meeting was held in conjunction with the 85th Anniversary Alumni Reunion Weekend. We want to keep you informed with notes from the Minutes of our 20th Annual Meeting. The Annual Meeting was called to order by Council President, "Coach" Bob Demont. He thanked everyone for their hard work for the Council, and

extended a warm welcome to all our alumni visitors. After welcoming new Board and Committee members and recognizing those who were selected for Sachem Award honors at the Alumni Council Fire, "Coach" passed the meeting on to Staff Members and Council Chairs who presented their reports.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR - "Chief" Garth Nelson "Chief" reviewed the 2004 goals set by the Executive Committee, including full camper enrollment (127 campers enrolled on a goal of 126), improving the quality of seasonal staff (an older group of staffers exercised excellent child centered judgments over the summer), and improving the quality of the program (progress reported in the area of vespers and weekly awards). He was pleased that so many board members had a chance to visit during the summer to evaluate the work towards these goals. He was also pleased to report progress on his own personal goals for 2004 including addressing nonseasonal staffing needs (added "Bos'n" Bill Auerswald as Business Manager to free "Chief" to pursue more of his Camp Director's responsibilities), getting more personally involved with program, campers, and staff (having a Business Manager helped free time which resulted in a more involved, energetic, and enthusiastic Camp Director), improving staff training (Agawam was involved with a national research project on training which will help to improve training in the future), and the definition of our Capital Projects (work was done on the Long Range Capital Plan with "Skipper" Jack Gorby and Bill Glass, separating longer term projects into three categories: maintenance of buildings, improvement of buildings, and replacement of buildings.) He concluded that the 85th season of Camp Agawam was a real success with happy campers, staff, and parents.



DIRECTOR OF DEVELOPMENT AND ALUMNI RELATIONS – "Bowman" Scott Malm "Bowman" was pleased to report the end of another successful fundraising year with \$167,000 raised on a goal of \$150,000 for our Annual Appeal. He thanked all the donors and all the volunteers who helped by writing letters, making phonathon calls (Bob Fryer and Alex Cobb, chairs), or by playing in the Golf Marathon (Bob Demont and Jim Carroll, chairs). All were pleased that over 25 founding members of the Hiawatha Society, Agawam's planned giving recognition society, were inducted at the Alumni Council Fire. Twenty alumni and friends volunteered for the 34th Main Idea program and great success was reported regarding our updated

website. "Bowman" concluded by expressing his gratitude to all in the Agawam Family for their friendship, guidance, and trust through 27 wonderful years as camper, counselor, waterfront director, program director, development and alumni relations director and assistant camp director.

DIRECTOR OF OPERATIONS – "Capt" Diehl Estes "Capt" reported the successful completion of the following projects: installation of an irrigation pump and sprinkler system for Forbes Field and the lower areas of our campus, installation of a berm near the waterfront to prevent erosion and storm water from affecting the lake, the successful completion of the renovations to the back road, and the impending improvements to the plumbing system in the Infirmary.



BUSINESS MANAGER – "Bos'n" Bill Auerswald "Bos'n" has begun to learn the business side of Agawam in order to lessen some of the burdens on "Chief" as our Camp Director. He has met with our Treasurer and Finance/Budget Committee, our insurance broker, and our accountants in order to get a more complete picture of camp's business environment. He has spent a lot of time learning about the 2004 budget as he works with "Chief" and the Board to plan our 2005 budget. He will also be working on extended season programming for our property in Raymond, refining our purchasing plans, and learning the development and accounting software that helps Agawam run.

PLANT COMMITTEE - "Skipper" Jack Gorby, chair The committee discussed two items over the weekend. The first involved deferred maintenance and capital improvements. They proposed that \$38,000 be spent in 2005 for routine maintenance and \$98,000 on capital projects including renovations to Arts & Crafts, the Boathouse, Clausen House, the Infirmary, Tall Pines and the Woodshop. They also agreed, in principal, to a three year \$261,000 deferred maintenance budget. The second item of business was approving further investigation of a forest management plan (including selective thinning of our own woodlands), to begin in the winter of 2005-2006. A sub-committee was formed and will be making a final recommendation at the Winter Board meeting.

PROGRAM COMMITTEE – "Admiral" Peter Wilson, chair

The committee enjoyed the opportunity to review several camp program elements including the addition of the Track and Field program to the Ags v. Wams competition, the changes made to the weekly awards program dramatically shifting the focus to camper achievements rather than staff-centered skits, and the continued health of the Katiaki program. They will continue to monitor the inauguration of the new Agawam Ski and Snowboard week scheduled for Christmas 2004, and will work with staff to expand use of our facility during the shoulder seasons. They encouraged the board to approve the expansion of the Main Idea program to include 105 campers with the addition of a class of 14 year olds in 2005. The committee also discussed the half-season program and recommended that our primary goal be filling camp with 7 week campers, with some exceptions, and that new half season campers be focused on the lower campus. The committee looks forward to discussing staff housing needs at its next meeting.

DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE – "Ranger" Jim Carroll, chair

The committee expressed gratitude to "Bowman" Scott Malm for his expertise and energy, since 1988, in expanding our development programs, including the annual appeal, phonathon, golf marathon and other fundraising successes. The committee gratefully acknowledged the special gift given by the Forbes family, which honored their devotion to Agawam. This gift enabled us to install the wonderful irrigation system on Forbes Field and throughout the lower part of our campus. The committee set a goal of \$162,000 as our 2005 Annual Appeal goal, which was later approved by the full Board. The committee is pleased with the growth of the Hiawatha Society, with the improvements to the website, and with the growth of the Main Idea program. Bob Dow, a Main Idea camper and volunteer counselor, has offered to help us establish an outreach program for Main Idea alums, and Karl Schoen-Rene has offered to help Agawam assess the value of the many books in our library and storage areas.

FINANCE COMMITTEE - "Gunner" Tim Crane, chair The committee reports that finances continue to be orderly and well thought out, and welcomes the addition of a Business Manager to their staffing. They are pleased with how well the work is progressing on the 2005 budget thanks to "Chief", "Bos'n" and several committee members. They report that our financial review by our independent auditors went as expected, and all are hopeful that the addition of the Business Manager should solve any dual control issues. The Investment subcommittee, chaired by "Doc" Peter Moran, reported that our investment target continues to be 70% equities and 30% fixed income, and that our annual endowment draw of 41/2% will occur as planned on September 30. Finally, the committee

proposed tuitions of \$5900 for seven week campers and \$3900 for half-season campers, which was approved by the full Board.

COMMUNICATIONS AND ALUMNI RELATIONS – "Cutter" Peter Gould, chair

The committee was grateful to Priscilla Demont for all her hard work in re-framing the damaged Governor Hall Pictures and to "Capt" Estes, "Nurse" Bowers, and "Mander" Malm for their efforts in rehanging these pictures in our new Governor Hall. The Camp's new and improved website has been up and running since Memorial Day with very positive response from campers, parents, and alumni, and they extended thanks to all the staff who worked hard to keep it fresh during the summer season. In order to keep the website as current as possible, the committee requested an annual budget of \$500. The committee was very pleased with the publication of the book "Braves Give Ear: Voices From The Great Central Fire" compiled by David Griffiths. They recommended that camp purchase a second digital camera so that we can keep up with the digital photographic needs of the camp including website, calendar, slide show, and camper/staff recruiting materials. The committee suggested that the administration follow up with the practice of putting Main Idea group photos in Governor Hall. The committee looks forward to working with "Chief" to develop a marketing plan for campers and staff, and to improve outreach of our alumni and friends.

EVALUATION AND HUMAN RESOURCES – "Mander" Steve Murray, chair

The committee is instituting a new evaluation of "Chief" in his role as Camp Director (as opposed to Executive Director of Agawam Council) drawing on three areas including a self evaluation, Parent Questionnaires, and Senior Staff feedback. Both "Chief" and the committee are looking forward to working with this new format. The committee will also continue to collect board member evaluations on their own board service, and will continue to evaluate the work and success of our board in comparison with other peer institutions. They look forward to interpreting the results from Agawam's involvement with the American Camp Association's national study of camper participant outcomes.



- Elected to first three-year Board terms: Scott Degerberg, Steve Slovenski, and Karin Whitten


The committee extended grateful thanks for the service of retiring Board Members Peter Esty, Tim
