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I always feel challenged when I start to prepare my annual greeting for the *Alumni News*. How am I going to capture the essence of an increasingly busy Camp season in a space small enough to beckon readership? An advantage we have as an institution is stability and tradition. I feel it's incumbent on me to reassure you that our programs and traditions at Agawam remain strong and meaningful. Those key aspects of Agawam, combined with alumni involvement, continue to produce the desired affects on young people we seek in our mission.

One of the high points of each summer, the Main Idea week (our 36^{th}) was especially satisfying in 2006. Our largest camper group ever, 107 boys, aged 9 – 14, arrived on June 17, met by a fine seasonal Agawam staff and 24 alumni volunteers. This was the second season for 14 year olds at the Main Idea. We have started to establish the same leadership role for them in the Main Idea community as our 15 year olds hold at Camp Agawam, and we enjoyed watching them rise to those challenges. There are many more boys from our neighboring communities who we would like to serve at the Main Idea, and we are seeking new ways to expand that part of our programming.

Camp Agawam's 87th season was a huge success, hosting a somewhat bursting camper group and supported by a fine and very hard working summer staff. The diverse camper group included 108 returning campers (78%), 32 sons, grandsons or other relatives of alumni, 17 international campers (12%), and 28 boys supported by our campership program (7 of whom started at Agawam as Main Idea campers). The program was very busy, with trips, intercamp competitions, Ag-Wam events, Councils, Vespers, Awards Ceremonies regattas and Korona runs accenting the daily assigned, specialty and optional activity periods. Seven quick weeks flew by and Camp became eerily quiet again on August 15!

But, as has been the case now for 17 summers, service to youth continued as Agawam hosted the coed performing arts camp run by the Seacoast Repertory in Portsmouth, NH. Their program, PAPA Camp, brought together 100 talented boys and girls for 11 days of performance and enjoyment of our campus. It was a difficult not to move about Camp in syncopation with the rhythms of their singing, dancing and percussion groups!

Coincident with PAPA Camp, and separated from it by Mawaga, Agawam extended the use of its newly-irrigated Upper Fields to Team Prep Soccer Camp for the fourth season. Team Prep brings both male and female prep school soccer teams together for five day training sessions during the two weeks after Camp Agawam ends. We are attracted to this camp because it blends good training and competition with excellent presentations regarding nutrition, injury prevention and treatment, and extensive programs on sportsmanship for the participants.

Community involvement and support has always been central to Agawam's tradition. Agawam's campers and staff are exposed to several community service opportunities in neighboring Raymond and Casco during the summer. But, at this point, the best example of being a good neighbor is the continuing cooperation between Agawam and Raymond Recreation. For four falls now, we have hosted practices and games for over 300 Raymond children who play in the Raymond Rec. Soccer program. So, while peace and quiet reign on the main campus at the end of August, the shouts and laughter of happy kids still echo on our Upper Fields until November!

This year, in addition to the youth services Agawam provided, our organization made important strides with an eye to the future. The Board of Directors of Agawam Council has commenced strategic planning, focused on several key areas, including possible youth development program expansion, increased community partnerships, enhanced alumni relations and activities, and efforts to further bolster the Council's financial capacity and stability. With a keen eye to the critical importance of preserving Agawam's core programs, the Main Idea and Camp Agawam, the Board has asked me to focus my efforts in these areas. To attain other goals, the Board has also realized that a new full time Executive Director was necessary. In the spring, they recruited and hired a fine person, with an extensive camping career, who we welcomed to Agawam in June.

"Guide" Peter Claypoole and I will work closely together to assure that Agawam and its existing initiatives remain vibrant, and to effect the planning and wishes of the Board in other areas. I certainly look forward to reporting our progress and successes in next fall's *Alumni News*!

2006 Ag v. Wam Season By "Trapper" Dan Cluchey

The 2006 Ag-Wam season furthered a seventy-nine year old tradition of sportsmanship, spirit, and passionate competition that has long been one of Agawam's most treasured institutions. Thirty-three hard fought events over the course of seven weeks determined the ultimate outcome, but, as always, the most crucial successes of the contests were the gentlemanly conduct and attitudinal excellence exhibited by the boys. Now in the books, the '06 season will be remembered as one of persistence, excitement, and fun.

Leading their teams into battle this summer were long-tenured senior boys Kyle Headley and Mike Anderson of the Ags and Wams, respectively. Anderson's Wams took the Fourth of July Base Relay – Ag-Wam's traditional inceptive event – in dramatic fashion, the culmination of sixty-four runners from each team coming down to less than a two second differential between the captains when all was said and done. The Ags responded in no uncertain terms, taking each of the next eight events and building an impressive twenty-six to five lead heading into "corn dog Sunday" and the old-timer and upper campus baseball games. Despite the bleak deficit, the Wams refused to quit, taking ten of the following thirteen three-point events - including a three-for-four effort on Super Sunday – and eventually tying the score at fifty points apiece with only four events to go. The Ags, having witnessed their once commanding lead dissolve to nothing, saved their best work for the finish, sweeping Archery, Riflery, the always exhilarating Camping, and Agawam's celebrated zenith, the Pony Express, to close the season with a seventy-one to fifty victory.

Having competed hard and well, the Ags took home their "pennants dear" while the Wams took home the promise of 2007. Another season of collaboration, competition, and brotherhood has come to a close, with the men of Agawam stronger and better friends for it. And so it goes...

A Message from the Executive Director

Dear Agawam Friends,

The successful 2006 Agawam season is over, our new fiscal year is just beginning and I am thrilled to be entering my first full year as the Executive Director of Agawam Council. It seems like a great time to introduce myself more thoroughly to you and share a brief commentary on Agawam today and tomorrow.

It has been a privilege to meet so many of you over the past few months. For those of you who I have not yet gotten to know, it might be most revealing for you to know that, while I am new to Agawam, I started going to camp when I was eight years old and never really stopped. By now I have been a camp director or executive director for 21 years, served as a summer camp staff person for five years and enjoyed nine glorious summers as a camper, for a total of 35 years at summer camp (so far). Prior to my start with Agawam, I served camping organizations in Michigan and Minnesota. My family and I now live in Portland. We are gradually becoming accustomed to life here in Maine and enjoying it.

My Agawam life began on June 6, 2006 when I arrived at Camp, dropped off my bags and put on a white staff shirt. The plan was to spend the summer at camp and soak up the Camp Agawam experience by being part of the summer staff observing and assisting with Main Idea and the seven week program. It was also a chance to meet and get acquainted with campers, parents, alumni, members of Agawam's Board and even a few Crescent Lake neighbors. What I observed over the course of the summer was an even better run camp operation and tradition than I had expected, and I had expected an outstanding camp.

We have a camp to be proud of from top to bottom, starting with "Chief" Garth Nelson who has led us for 22 years and continues to be a consummate, highly respected camp director. No less significant is the talent, dedication and involvement of our Board of Directors as exemplified by our outgoing President "Coach" Bob Demont and our new President "Bos'n" Frank Anthony. We are supported by a strong team of year-round and seasonal staff. The camp itself is in great shape, maintaining a simple traditional campus with a strong collection of program equipment and facilities. The programs continue to set the standard for character building and personal development for boys. Both the Main Idea program and the seven week Camp Agawam season give boys extraordinary opportunities to learn skills, make positive life long friends, establish healthy habits and learn from the outstanding role models set by the camp staff and volunteers. There continues to be an extra special magic, wonder and joy that flows through each day of camp as manifested in inter-camp tournaments, awards, Ag/Wam competitions, the running of Korona and so many other daily activities and special events. Council Fires still offer mystery. humor and tradition, along with the reinforcing of the Wood Craft Laws, commendations for accomplishments and the affirmation that comes from achieving a Katiaki goal. Most of all, it is the boys themselves who make, as they always have, Agawam so special. It was sheer joy getting to know many of our campers by serving as an instructor at the high ropes course, archery range and even in a sail boat. I did indeed soak up a lot this summer, but I am humbly mindful of how much I have yet to learn and appreciate. I am also dedicated to seeing that these established programs continue and flourish for generations to come.

In addition to affirming the future of our long standing programs at Camp Agawam, I want to assure you all that "Chief" Garth Nelson is still firmly in charge of those programs. To summer camp staff, campers and parents, nothing about "Chief's" role has changed, and we are fortunate for that to be true. With the installation of a new Executive Director, "Chief" will have the opportunity to give even greater attention to assuring a high quality Main Idea program and seven week Camp Agawam season. "Chief" will also continue to serve as our point staff person for fund development. In fact, his role as Director of Development may continue to evolve as we move forward.

I am honored that "Chief" bestowed on me the camp title of "Guide." That title seems fitting for an Executive Director whose job has so much to do with strategic planning and overall management. The Executive Director position is intended to both complement "Chief's" now more focused role and be an expansion of the Executive Director role that "Chief" previously held. In terms of a chart of organization, the Executive Director is the head of all staff and is responsible for overall management, strategic planning and long term development of Agawam's programs, facilities, human resources, financial affairs and all other assets. Along with the Board of Directors, the Executive Director is the primary shepherd of Agawam's mission. Accordingly, much of my job is working with the Board of Directors to shape plans and policies and then work to turn those plans and policies into actions and accomplishments.

Speaking of plans and accomplishments, we have opened a new year-round headquarters located at the corner of Routes 302 and 115 in Windham, Maine. Most of the contents of the Hanover office have been moved to Maine. A smaller office in Hanover has been retained as a work place for "Chief." However, "Chief" will be at the office in Maine at least twice a month as well. The Windham office site was selected for various reasons including its location half way between Camp and Portland and its proximity to many of the vendors and other services we rely on throughout the year and especially during the summer. Look to the head of this letter for the complete address and phone number for the new office.

As we move ahead, you can expect that the Main Idea and seven week Camp Agawam programs that have defined Agawam thus far will continue and be well cared for. You can also expect that Agawam will seek out new and complementary ways to carry on in the spirit established by the Masons to provide exceptional character building, life shaping programs of fun and adventure. Over the coming months I will continue working with the Board and staff to refine a strategic vision and plan for Agawam Council and Camp Agawam. That plan will be a comprehensive one attending to existing and emerging programs, human resources, financial development, property, facilities, equipment, public relations and marketing.

I am always very happy to talk with anyone who cares about Agawam and I invite you to call, write or visit. I look forward to hearing your suggestions and concerns, responding to your questions and enjoying your Agawam stories.


News of The Masons

Beauty

Be clean, both yourself and the place you live in. Understand and respect your body, for it is the temple of the spirit. Be a friend to all harmless wildlife. Conserve the woods and flowers, and be especially ready to fight wild-fire in forest or in town.

Truth

Word of honor is sacred. Play fair; foul play is treachery. Be reverent; worship the Great Spirit and respect all worship of him by others.

Fortítude

Be brave. Courage is the noblest of all attainments. Be silent while your elders are speaking and otherwise show them deference. Obey. Obedience is the first duty of the Woodcrafter.

Love

Be kind. Do at least one act of unbargaining service each day. Be helpful. Do your share of the work. Be joyful. Seek the joy of being alive.

Dear Friends of Agawam,

We are resolved in our commitment to both of these programs and to being careful not to undertake any initiative that would put them in any jeopardy. In that regard, I pay close attention to the guidance and perspective that "Chief" Garth Nelson offers, not only as our Camp Director for over 20 years, but as keeper of so many of our traditions and our commitment to developing responsible young men, for years to come.

It has also been my distinct privilege to work closely with "Guide" Peter Claypoole in his transition to Executive Director of Agawam Council. I have been impressed with his extraordinary ability to zero in on the key themes and issues for the overall enterprise. In the meantime, if you are a current parent, we welcome your specific advice and feedback. We hope that each of your sons came home in August changed for the good from his experience at Camp. "Chief" is fully engaged in running a dynamic program that strives to reach each boy with positive messages about being the best that he can be. This is continuously reinforced in cabin life, on trips, on the playing fields, in activity skill instruction, and through the long-standing Katiaki program of weekly character development goals. We thank you for sharing your sons with us at Camp, and we are ever mindful of the trust that you place in "Chief" and his team to provide a safe and positive experience for them. Guide and I are working closely with Chief to ensure that he has the resources and support necessary to accomplish that mission.

Agawam was created and nurtured with the vision and focused commitment of the Mason family, preserved for the future by Agawam Council with "Chief's" leadership and guidance, and it thrives with the continued involvement and commitment of you, our alumni.
